Insight From God's Word: All Things New Through The Christ Child!

the birth of the Christ Child. Some of our loved ones may still be home for Christmas, but others have already returned. The Christmas Eve services were a joy, reinforcing that old, old story which we have heard, year after year, of the birth of God's only Son to be the Savior of the world. The presents have been unwrapped and some returned. Another Christmas has come and gone. So why do we keep on celebrating Christmas? The story is always the same!

We celebrate the birth of the Christ Child, because Christ makes all things new. For example, even secular society numbers each year as part of a new era which began with the birth of the Christ Child. We are shortly entering the new year A. D. 2024, from the Latin "anno Domini", meaning "year of our Lord 2024."

Secondly, through faith in Christ we are members of the **new covenant** in His blood. In that new covenant, we receive the forgiveness of sins and eternal life. In the Holy Supper of the new covenant, we receive Christ's body and blood. In this new covenant, we forgive others, because God has first forgiven us in Christ.

Thirdly, through the Christ Child we are **new creations**. Through baptism into Christ, His death daily becomes our death, so that we die to sin and come alive again, sharing in Christ's resurrection. Because we are new creations in Christ, every day God gives us the power to turn over a new leaf: to turn from our sin habits to godly living for the sake of and by the power of Christ.

May this year's celebration of the birth of

the Christ Child be a reminder to you that **all things are new through the Christ Child**. May you look to the new year as the opportunity to demonstrate that truth in your life. Pastor Brechbuhl

St. Paul tells the Ephesians that the first commandment with a specific promise attached to it is, "Honor your father and mother so that it may go well with you, and you may live long in the land" (Eph. 6:2). This promise is one indication of the importance of this commandment. The other thing that highlights the special nature of this commandment is its placement within the Ten Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are clearly organized in two big categories. The first three commandments deal with our relationship with God. This category is called the First Table of the Law. The last seven commandments, the Second Table of the Law, tell us how we should relate to other people. These two tables correspond to what Jesus calls the two greatest commandments: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:37–39).

The order of the Second Table of the Law is also important. Murder is a greater sin than adultery, which is a greater sin than stealing, or lying, or coveting. But why is the Fourth Commandment first in the Second Table, ahead of "you shall not murder"? Is disobeying your parents really worse than murder? Or maybe we should give up on thinking these commandments are ordered?

The overall effect of this order is to get us to see our parents as a connection point between our neighbors and our God. Throughout our upbringing our father and mother stand between us and God and deliver His gifts to us: God clothes us, feeds us, protects us and teaches His Word to us through our parents.

So, parents have a very high calling from God. They are called to be stewards of the greatest gift: the gift of life.

Parenting thus gives us a keen insight into all our stewardship. Parents know that they have been given a great treasure in their children, a treasure that does not belong to them, yet for which they feel a great deal of responsibility. Truth be told, every gift we have been given is like this, because everything we have — whether our own personal skills and powers or our wealth and time — is all from God. He entrusts it all to us so that we can use it all and take care of it all for His great purposes.
