"Christ Is Risen!"

In about 1929, Nikolai Bukharin, a leading official of the Communist Party in the Soviet Union and chief ally of Chairman Joseph Stalin, journeyed from Moscow to Kiev. His mission was to address a huge assembly of the people who had been ordered to come to listen to him. His subject, the foolishness of Christianity and the superiority of atheism.

For a solid hour, he aimed his heaviest verbal artillery at Christianity, repeatedly bellowing out argument and ridicule directed at the resurrection of Jesus Christ. When he had finished, he glared at his captive audience, and viewed what he assumed was now the smoldering ashes of their Christian faith. "Are there any questions?" Bukharin demanded.

After a long period of deafening silence, one man slowly stood up and asked permission to speak. He carefully mounted the speaker's platform and moved close to the Communist leader. The audience was breathlessly silent, as the man surveyed them first to the right, then to the left.

At last, he shouted the ancient Christian greeting, "Christ Is Risen!" The vast assembly immediately arose as one man, and the response came crashing back like the sound of an avalanche, "He Is risen, indeed!!"

Jesus said, "I am the Living One; I was dead, and behold I am alive for ever and ever! And I hold the keys of death and Hades." *(Revelation 1:18)* Every Easter, we celebrate our living Savior, who though He died for all sin, came alive and lives forever. Because He lives, we too will live forever! Pastor Brechbuhl

Footnote: Bukharin, about a decade later, orchestrated by rival Communist leaders, was accused of treason, convicted in a show trial, and executed!

Whose Is It Anyway?

If you have every bought or sold a house, you are acquainted with the concept of a "title search." Before you can sell your house, and before anyone else will feel comfortable putting down the money to buy it, you have to prove that you really own it. So a title company looks through the public records to ensure that you bought it from the person who really owned it, who bought it from the person who really owned it before that, all the way back to the earliest records of your state, including when your state was only a territory or colony of England. Peak into a preschool classroom during playtime and you'll see a simplified version of this. A child starts playing with a ball, but another child says, "That's mine: I had it first." You can't understand the Seventh Commandment without understanding this concept of ownership or title. As the Small Catechism puts it: You shall not steal. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income. Your neighbor's possessions are his: you don't have a right to take them. And likewise, your possessions are yours. Ownership and property rights are foundational to any functioning society. But there is something deeper to know about ownership, and that is the question of who has the title and ownership to you? Paul says, "Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God? You are not your own, for you were bought with a price" (1 Cor. 6:19-20). If you yourself are owned by God, then of course everything that you own, you really only possess by God's leave: all of it, at bottom, belongs to Him since you belong to Him. For you were bought with the blood of Christ. This notion is the foundation of all Christian stewardship. It all belongs to God. It should all be used for things that bring honor to His name, blessings to our neighbors and the extension of His kingdom.
