Why Do We Have a School?

Even before I was installed at Salem as your pastor, I kept hearing different questions about our school. "Why do students keep leaving?" "Who will we

have as teachers this year?" "How are we going to turn things around?" These are good questions. The trouble is, I still don't think I can answer them. And please, cut me some slack here, I haven't been around all that long yet. Since I can't yet answer the questions I keep hearing rumbling around our church, school, and community, I'd rather answer a different question: Why do we have a school?

When Salem started its school in 1859, it was for two reasons. First, teach the German kids in town how to speak German. Second, and more importantly, to teach these kids the faith—to let these children come to Jesus Christ. For 165 years, Salem has taught the Word of God to children. We don't teach much German these days, but we continue that essential tradition. We teach Christ crucified and risen for the salvation of everyone that believes. Salem Lutheran School still exists today because Jesus Christ rose from death and the world needs to know. Our children need to know.

In its early years, our school taught German to the children of German immigrants to preserve some sense of culture and a home they left behind. Today, I see a strange parallel emerging. The culture we swim in no longer supports the Gospel. Rather, our culture seems to keep finding new, wicked lies to pervert our imaginations. Thanks be to God, most of you reading this today discern these lies and reject the pleasure obsession in our culture. But even mature and lifelong Christians find themselves falling in love with this world, clinging to the perishable things rather than the imperishable. The promises of Christ are laid aside to chase fickle feelings. And in such a world—in this time and place—how can we leave the faith formation of our children to an hour or two on Sundays?

Salem started its school for the sake of its cultural heritage and its heritage of faith. Now, as a church, we continue this work of educating our children for their heritage and inheritance—the eternal life won for them in Christ Jesus. No greater purpose could be imagined. And no other school in Jacksonville will proclaim Christ

like we will. Jesus will be known through our work together for our children.

When it comes to those other questions I mentioned earlier, I'm starting to think I don't need to worry so much about them. They matter. They're important, of course. But I'm not concerned. I'm praying to the Lord Jesus and entrusting Him with the future of our church and school. I invite you to do the same. Commit our work unto the Lord in prayer. Let's see what He does. Pastor Schultz

The Rewards of Godliness

It's no secret that you can't bribe your way into heaven. No amount of good works will impress God enough to open heaven's door for their sake. "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23) and the person who "keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it" (James 2:10). Rather, salvation is "the free gift of God ... in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:23).

So, your good works won't earn you the reward of heaven. But does that mean that there are no rewards at all? Consider what the Small Catechism says in the "Close of the Commandments":

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Ex. 20:5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands. (SC II)

God promises to bless you in keeping His commandments. What might these blessings be? Well, consider what Paul says about keeping the Fourth Commandment: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 'Honor your father and mother' (this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land'" (Eph. 6:1–3).

And think about what your life would be like if you went around stealing (breaking the Seventh Commandment), telling lies about people (breaking the Eighth Commandment), and generally being cruel to those around you (breaking all the commandments!).

That is obviously not a blessed way to live. In fact, you'd be miserable living that way.

And Jesus says more about what is in store for those who make sacrifices for His sake: "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on His glorious throne, you who have followed Me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for My name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life'" (Matt. 19:28–29).

So don't grow impatient in doing good. Follow the Lord who has freely given you everlasting life.
